

Taco Soup

2 lbs ground beef

2 cups diced onions

1 (15.5 oz) can pinto beans

1 (15.5 oz) can pink kidney beans

1 (15.5 oz) can whole kernel corn, drained

1 (14.5 oz) can Mexican-style stewed tomatoes

Optional garnishments: corn chips, sour cream, grated cheese, green onions

1 (14.5 oz) can diced tomatoes

1 (14.5 oz) can tomatoes with chiles

2 (4.5 oz) cans diced green chiles

1 (4.6 oz) can black olives drained and sliced

1/2 cup green onions, sliced

1 package taco seasoning

1 (1 oz) ranch dressing mix

Brown the ground beef and onions in large skillet; drain excess fat, then transfer the browned beef and onions to a large slow cooker or stockpot. Add the beans, corn, tomatoes, green chiles, black olives, green onions, taco seasoning, and ranch dressing mix and cook in a slow cooker on low for 6-8 hours or simmer on low heat for about 1 hour in a pot on the stove. To serve: Place a few corn chips in each bowl and ladle soup over them. Top with sour cream, cheese, and green onions.

Every day, regular people like you lose their hard-earned money to online phishing scams. In 2022, scammers stole over \$8.8 billion from regular people like you. Don't fall for fake!



Text Message

Phishing text messages attempt to trick you into sharing personal information like your password, PIN, or social security number to gain access to your bank account. As long as you don't respond to these messages and delete them instead, your information is safe. All you need to do is spot the signs of a scam before you click or reply.

What if I Fall for a Phishing Text?

1. Change your password if you clicked on a link and entered any sort of username and password into a fake site.
2. Contact the bank.
3. If you lost money, file a police report.
4. Report the scam to the Federal Trade Commission or call 1-877-382-4357

SINAI FIRE AND RESCUE

The annual Sinai Fire Department auction was held August 12th with over 95 individuals submitting items for auction. There were over 1,000 items auctioned ranging from guns and miscellaneous supplies to semi tractors and farm equipment. Ninety percent of the auctioned item proceeds were returned to the owner, and ten percent went to the fire department. This was the largest auction so far with over \$25,000 being raised. The proceeds will be used to pay annual operating expenses and equipment improvements for the department. This was the 5th annual auction held by the fire department.



Each Year in South Dakota

- Breast cancer is the fourth leading cause of cancer deaths among women
- An estimated 645 women are diagnosed with breast cancer
- An estimated 102 women die from breast cancer
- Fewer than 34 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer
- An estimated 11 women die from cervical cancer

Early Detection Saves Lives

Women are more likely to live when breast and cervical cancer are found early. All women are at risk for having breast cancer and the risk gets higher as time passes. Throughout the month of October, the color pink is worn to recognize and support those who have been diagnosed with, are battling, or are recovering from the disease.

For the privilege of wearing jeans on Friday, CSB staff members contribute a dollar per week to a charity of their choosing. This year, the Arlington staff donated \$1,150 to Kingsbury County Cancer Cares, Inc.
